Q-Shift: Decision-Making in the Age of Quantum AI (2023-2025)

Q-Shift systematically examines the cultural and social implications of Quantum AI through three perspectives: the influence of technological narratives on research and public good, the effects on decision-making and distributive justice, and the legal challenges to foundational principles and democratic legitimacy. The project aims to provide empirical insights and develop tools to enhance Quantum AI literacy, helping society anticipate and manage its impacts responsibly. Funded by the CHANSEconsortium.

Modulating discretion in hybrid AI/human decision-making in legal settings (2022-2023)

This project sought to further integrate the research projects that are currently undertaken at the KU Faculty of Law that explore AI and legal decision making by engaging students directly in the design of AI legal decision making studies. The project is designed to evaluate how students can use empirical methods to address legal issues that are traditionally approached as largely conceptual, theoretical, or philosophical.. The project allowed students to test their ideas about the law and go beyond the first level of abstraction to the development of concrete knowledge. The project was funded by the university of Copenhagen's "experiments to integrate research into teaching" programme. (DKK 50.000)

PACTA - Public Administration and Computational Transparency in Algorithms (2019-2023)

Machine learning and associated technologies have progressed significantly over the last decade profoundly transforming our economy, our social relations, and our information retrieval practices. Now, these new technologies, with both their promise and their dangers, are being transferred into public administration in the form of algorithmic decision making (ADM). ADM is challenging traditional administrative practices by introducing an untested way of producing administrative decisions that have the ability affect the rights of individual citizens and questions the legality of the practice itself. PACTA investigates the fundamental problems relating to the interaction of legality in public administration and ADM. We do so by focusing on the following three areas of public administration: welfare administration; policing/criminal investigation; and, general problems in administrative law. COLLAGE: COde, Law & LanGuage (2019-2021)

Some technological advancements compel society to reassess if their legal regulations are sufficiently able to address the challenges those technologies bring with them. More often than not, the answers to the legal questions these technologies pose are shaped by how they are framed. The aim of COde, Law, and LanguAGe (COLLAGE) is to investigate how linguistic framing affects legal responses to new technology, specifically genetic modification and algorithmic decision making.
